Ukraine and the Ukrainian people have been turned into an instrument of Western policy to destabilize Russia. This operation will last till all its aims, pointed by our President Vladimir Putin, are reached. Our cause is just, and we will win. No doubt.

The multipolar world means being more just and transparent. And this is one of the aims of today's struggle – struggle for the better life of our children, struggle against undermining traditional values and the entire name of family, for the better future of the whole world. Now the center of gravity of the global growth is rapidly moving towards Asia-Pacific region, including South Asia.

The Russian-Sri Lankan relations provide a good example of sincere friendship and mutual understanding that can exist between two countries. Our states have similar approaches to important foreign policy

We have launched productive interaction in the UN, its specialized agencies, and institutions, as well as other multilateral organizations, including the Shanghai Cooperation Organisation, where Sri Lanka has a dialogue partner status. We welcome the Sri Lanka aspirations to join BRICS where Russia is one of the founders. And, of course, we deeply appreciate its balanced position on the Ukrainian issue despite all the pressure and efforts to incline Sri Lanka to Western side of the conflict.

Russia and Sri Lanka are expanding trade, economic, cultural, educational, humanitarian and tourism ties. Our country remains one of the major importers of Ceylon tea. Russia continues its active cooperation with Sri Lanka in the energy field. Sri Lanka has become one of the main destinations for Russian tourists. Our citizens are on the leading positions among travelers arriving to Sri Lanka for vacations.

Russian higher education is rightfully top rated worldwide for its high quality standards. Thousands of Sri Lankan citizens have got higher education in Russia and USSR throughout the last six decades. Many graduates reached significant positions in their corresponding professional areas, became high ranking officials, prominent businessmen and top level specialists in various fields. Currently, we are working on increasing the number of state-sponsored grants for Russian higher education.

Extracts from the Interview of the Deputy Minister of Foreign Affairs of the Russian Federation A. A. Pankin on the 10th anniversary of the signing of the Eurasian Economic Union (EAEU) Treaty

The EAEU is one of the most advanced integration associations in Eurasia, within which there are no customs borders between the participants, there are "four freedoms" of movement of goods, services, labor and capital, and a common internal market. Today the Union includes Russia, Belarus, Kyrgyzstan, Kazakhstan and Armenia.

The differences between the EAEU and other regional organizations are primarily in its agenda, which is defined precisely by the Treaty on the Union, which stipulates that our association is an international organization of regional economic integration. According to the Agreement, a number of competencies of the member states have been transferred to the Eurasian Economic Commission (EEC) under supranational jurisdiction. This applies to foreign trade policy, customs tariff and non-tariff regulation, technical regulation and a number of other issues.

An important difference between the EAEU and other integration associations in the post-Soviet space is also the fundamental principle of consensus, on the basis of which most decisions in the Union are made. In simple terms, nothing is done without the consent of all parties, regardless of their contribution to the budget and economy of the EAEU. This, in turn, entails the ability to listen and hear each other, take into account the interests of all participants in the association and try to find compromises.

Such practices definitely benefit all EAEU member-states. From 2015 to 2023 the Union

GDP grew from 1.6 to 2.4 trillion dollars, industrial production in the EAEU increased by 25.4%, agricultural production – by almost 30%. We proceed from the fact that a hypothetical rejection of Eurasian economic integration by someone would be contrary to their interests. In 2023, the GDP of all the countries of the Union grew. The growth rate in each economy of the "five" exceeded the global one (3.2%, according to IMF estimates) and amounted to 8.7% in Armenia, 6.2% in Kyrgyzstan, 5.1% in Kazakhstan and 3.9% in Belarus.

We managed to significantly increase the

volume of mutual trade with partners in the EAEU, while in 2015-2023 exports of domestic products increased by 2 times, and imports from the countries of the union – by 3 times, and about a quarter of goods in mutual trade are cars, vehicles and the equipment. At the same time, according to the latest data, the share of settlements in national currencies is about 90%. This statistic indicates that there is a demand for our products, they are competitive and occupy a certain niche in the partner markets.

It needs mentioning that the EAEU is, first of all, about people and for people. A fairly recent example: on May 2, the Agreement on Mutual Recognition of documents on academic degrees in the EAEU states came into force. This means in practice that an academic degree obtained in either country will be automatically recognized in the other. This norm will allow citizens of our countries to significantly save time and money when searching for and going to work, ease the bureaucratic burden on the educational authorities of the member states, increase the mobility of the population and open up new opportunities for them.

An even more vivid example of how the EAEU achievements apply to ordinary citizens is related to an area of technical regulation, namely the labeling of goods. Almost every product on the Union market has the "EAC" (Eurasian Compliance) mark, which means that this product meets the quality and safety standards of the EAEU.

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RUSSIA STEADILY FOLLOWING ITS WAY FORWARD

Russia is a dynamically developing country. The disintegration of the Soviet Union was followed by hard times for the people, state and economy. The terror war by extremists inspired by the Western powers was unleashed against us. Only when Mr. Vladimir Putin was elected as President, the situation began stabilizing which made possible the growth of the Russian economy and its population living standards.

Today Russia is a federative state of 89 regions – Republics (24), Krai (9), Oblasts (48), Federal Cities (3), Autonomous areas (4) and one Autonomous oblast. More than 146 mln people of 150 ethnic groups live in Russia on the vast territory of more than 17 mln sq.km. It is a secular state with Christian majority, where nevertheless the rights of all faiths' followers are secured. Throughout the centuries Muslims, Buddhists and other religions have lived peacefully with Christians. And this kind of mutually respectful

coexistence will be further carefully preserved regardless the external efforts to disrupt it.

In recent years our country has launched numerous programs aimed at rebuilding economy, infrastructure and improving living standards of ordinary people. Hundred thousand kilometers of new and reconstructed roads and railways were built to ease the transition of passengers and goods. Numerous new factories are opening each year to give people jobs and produce the needed items. The intercity and internal transport including more active use of electrobuses and suburban trains is also under development.

For hundreds of years the Kerch straight was an obstacle on the route from Cuban to Crimea. Now, under the Decree of the President, by the hard efforts of thousands citizens, this impediment is removed and the beautiful Crimean Bridge binds the banks of that straight, parts of

one indivisible country. The peninsula that finally came back to the native harbor, has direct, solid and short connection with the South of Russia. In the Russian North you can witness powerful atomic icebreakers, which pave the way for the caravans of ships passing through the North Maritime Route, the shortest sea route from the Northern Europe to China and North America.

20 percent of the Russian electricity generation (no breaks in supply and power shortages) is produced by nuclear power stations. Russia is an undisputable leader in this sphere, and there is no other country in the world with the same strong and reliable expertise in nuclear technologies.

The Russia's experience in space exploration is also unique. Our country is a leader in orbit launches. Our cosmonauts surf the outer space and carry out researches for future generations and improvement of

everyday life. We are aimed at discovering new planets' surfaces, delivering scientists to the Moon as a part of our Lunar program.

Despite the illegal western sanctions and attempts to "cancel" Russia, our industry is steadily developing. There is a significant growth in mechanical engineering, light industry, car and tractor manufacturing and some other areas. Our opponents predicted the deficit of goods and long queues of unemployed and hungry workers but our manufacturers, on the contrary, managed to increase production and thus ensure our food security.

We are a peaceful nation fully devoted to the international law. But Western countries, that see themselves as a globe hegemon, tend to take kindness for weakness. That's why – and also due to their colonialist nature – they unleashed a total

war, a genocide against Russians with the hands of a brotherly nation – Ukraine. Blatant abominable proxy war was aimed at eradicating the Russian culture and history. We had no choice but to protect our people, our children, our borders and our state. That's why the Special Military Operation in Ukraine was launched, and it will last till the fulfilment of its goals. No doubt that we will defeat the enemy!

As it was in 90s the West wants to defeat Russia and loot our heritage.

They would prefer not to see it on the map, at least that strong. But we, Russians, do need our country. And the rest of the world also does. Since it is the question of life and death, we will not allow them to implement their cruel fantasies.

Long live our Motherland – the Great Russia! Long live our people – united and free!

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Extracts from the Interview of the Deputy Minister of Foreign Affairs of the Russian Federation A. A. Pankin on the 10th anniversary of the signing of the Eurasian Economic Union (EAEU) Treaty

In addition to its impressive economic performance the EAEU has sufficient weight in the international arena. It is one of the economic centers of Greater Eurasia. The Union has 3 free trade agreements (FTAs) with Vietnam, Serbia and Iran, as well as 2 non-preferential agreements with China. Relevant work has been launched on the preparation of similar documents with Egypt, Indonesia and the United Arab Emirates. Negotiations on a temporary trade agreement with Mongolia have been launched.

The EEC has signed more than 80 memoranda of understanding or cooperation with various international and regional organizations, as well as

Governments of third countries from Latin America, Africa, the Middle East, and the Asia-Pacific region.

Cooperation with Uzbekistan and Cuba, which received the status of an observer state at the EAEU in 2020, is being strengthened.

If we move away from official terms, I will say this: the EAEU is people. These are the people who are working to build the Eurasian economic integration, and the people for whom this is being done. And, of course, we would like the people of our countries to know and appreciate the efforts to create and improve economic processes within the framework of the EAEU.
